The information we shared about Selma...

Sons of Norway Harald Haarfager Lodge has been active in our community since 1910. And today marks a special anniversary. July 4, 1825, 199 years ago, organized immigration of Norwegians seeking a new home in America, began. The first group, seeking religious freedom, endured a three month voyage. Later voyages brought those seeking freedom from poverty, famine, and political persecution.



They sought economic security, land ownership, and educational and social advancement. Our sailing ship, Selma, represents immigrants who departed for a two to three month voyage, before steam ships were invented. These immigrants helped build the beautiful tapestry of cultures that our America has become. We recognize this immigration had huge consequences for many but Sons of Norway lodges invest in their communities and still contribute to the beauty of America through fellowship, giving, cultural events and community service.

Some Vikings were shipbuilders who crossed raging seas in elaborate ships for plundering and conquering, but also for peaceful trading. The design of the Vikings longships, influenced shipbuilding for centuries.

The secret behind the fast-moving longship is its long, narrow hull, kept stable by a keel. Light enough to be carried, it was designed for speed and easy navigation in shallow waters. The longship was double-ended, allowing it to reverse direction without the need to turn. This was a significant advantage in a sea filled with concealed icebergs and sea ice.

Longships had oars along almost the entire length of the vessel, with later versions adding sails.

NORDIC CULTURE CORNER

In June, two HH members were featured in a cultural arts display at the Art Spirit Gallery in Coeur d'Alene. Last summer, Ed Ronningen and Carol Uptagrafft were contacted by Idaho Commission on the Arts to participate in Between Borders: Folklife Through the Coeur d'Alenes, a special project exploring cultural arts in the Northwest region between Montana and Washington. This exhibit explored the vibrant traditions of folk artistry and features the work of artisans whose crafts reflect the rich and adaptable cultural heritage of residents in Kootenai, Shoshone and parts of Benewah counties. Each piece displays a blend of historical technique and personal expression representative of the cultural community from which they derive. showcasing the unique skill and creativity of these local artists. From the Silver Valley through the Coeur d'Alene Mountains and river area, this folk artistry is a cornerstone of Idaho's cultural history, representing a tapestry of influences and traditions. The intricate patterns of guilt makers and the craftsmanship of fly tiers that correlate to the Panhandle's waterways each tell a story of community, identity and continuity. Visitors of the exhibit were invited to appreciate the artistry and dedication behind each craft. How these traditions are preserved and reimagined by contemporary practitioners, was highlighted, celebrating the diversity of crafts and ongoing vitality of folk arts in the region. "Between Borders" revealed the deep connections between art and everyday life. The works were not just decorative; they serve functional purposes and carry cultural significance. enriching the lives of those who create and use them. This exhibition offers a profound look at the enduring impact of folk art on the Panhandle region, encouraging visitors to reflect on their own heritage and the ways in which the traditional arts continue to shape the world. On July 4, 1825, a group of 52 Norwegians set sail on the ship Restauration to make the first organized migration from Norway to North America. Since that first voyage, about 900,000 people have followed, leaving their homes in search of opportunities and a better life. While many returned to Norway, most stayed and built a new home in the New World. Today nearly 5 million people in North America claim Norwegian ancestry.

Crossings commemorates 200 years of organized Norwegian migration to North America. It's a year to celebrate the strong ties between Norway, the United States, and Canada. It's an opportunity to remember what it means to take great risks and trade one home for another. And it's a chance to better understand the movement of peoples that continues worldwide today.

Although Sweden sent more emigrants to the United States than any other Scandinavian country, Norway sent a greater percentage of its population—nearly 1 million people between 1820 and 1920. Some estimates suggest that during the great immigrations of the 19th century Norway lost a higher proportion of its people to the U.S. than any country other than Ireland.

Norwegian immigration's Mayflower moment came in 1825, during a period of particularly fierce religious strife in Norway. In July of that year, a group of six dissenting families, seeking a haven from the official Norwegian state church, set sail from Stavanger in an undersized sloop, the Restaurationen. When it arrived in New York harbor on October 9, 1825, after a 14-week journey, the the passengers and crew were arrested for exceeding the allowed number of people on board. They were later pardoned by President John Q. Adams. The local press marveled at the bravery of these Norwegian pilgrims. Local Quakers helped the destitute emigrants, who eventually established a community in upstate New York. Today, their descendants are still known as "sloopers".

Word of the sloopers' arrival, and of other Norwegians' success in the U.S., soon reached their homeland, and America letters circulated as never before. In the 1840s, prospective emigrants could read a new magazine, *Norway and America*, that published stories of Norwegians in the New World, and successful emigrants toured Norway, some sponsored by financial concerns in the U.S. One emigrant, Andreas Ueland, described the effect that one homecoming emigrant had on his compatriots.

A farmer from Houston County, Minnesota, returned on a visit the winter of '70-'71. He infected half the population in that district with what was called the America fever, and I who was then the most susceptible caught the fever in its most virulent form. No more amusement of any kind, only brooding on how to get away to America. It was like a desperate case of homesickness reversed.

Immigration surged after the U.S. Civil War. By the end of the 1860s there were more than 40,000 Norwegians in the U.S. More than one-ninth of Norway's total population, 176,000 people, came in the 1880s. These immigrants, mostly rural families, made their way to the newly-opened lands of the Midwest, settling in Minnesota and Wisconsin, then moving west to lowa, the Dakotas and sometimes the Pacific Coast. By the end of century, urban Norwegians had begun to arrive in substantial numbers as well, and formed lasting communities in the cities of the Great Lakes and East Coast. Norwegian immigration dropped off dramatically after the Immigration Act of 1924, and quickly slowed to a few thousand a year—a rate that has remained largely unchanged to present day.





Do you know the colors of the flag of Norway?



The flag of Norway is deep red with a dark blue cross outlined in white. colors are inspired by the flags of France, United Kingdom and the United States, and represent liberty and independence. The flag was created in 1821 by Fredrik Meltzer, a member of Norway's parliament, but it wasn't flown until 1899, when Norway and Sweden ended their union.
